# **Committee updates**







WiN UK has four main committees working hard to forward WiN UK's objectives. Here is an update on their recent activities.



Integrated activities looks at areas of work which cover each of the three main objectives of WiN UK – attraction, retention and dialogue.

In the Summer we took up the challenge of drafting our WiN Industry Charter, to help nuclear sector businesses address gender balance. John Clarke, Chief Executive of the NDA, formally launched the Charter at the NDA national supply chain event in November and WiN UK is pleased to have 14 companies signed up with more in the pipeline. We have been delighted by the company responses as the pledges really do suggest that gender equality and inclusivity are important to these organisations.

We're not done yet though. We want more companies to sign up before the WiN national conference. It would also be great to share these pledges with you over the coming months. If you are not sure whether your company has signed up, do ask them and encourage them to do so.

The work doesn't stop there though. We are currently developing an Online Career Guide to provide a platform for new and existing people working in the industry to make most of available resources, connect, self-develop and lead by example in their individual career paths. We'll be launching the guide at the Conference — so stay tuned!



The Attraction committee, alongside EDF Energy, held "the best school trip ever" with a group of students from Springwood High School in Kings Lynn who took part in interactive activities and a tour of Sizewell B in Suffolk.

Assistant head teacher Sally Aviss, said that feedback from the students was very positive and they really enjoyed the day.

These events are important in order to show potential future engineers how the nuclear sector works. It was a fantastic opportunity for the aspiring female engineers and scientists to be able to speak to female employees at EDF Energy who have chosen STEM careers.

It was especially nice to see even the quieter members of the group engaging and asking questions of the interview panel. Some students said it has changed their view of nuclear power in a positive way and how shown the importance of STEM subjects in the world of work.



The communications committee, or Dialogue, has been busy promoting WiN UK.

Miranda Kirschel spoke at the Nuclear Industry Association, the trade body for the nuclear sector, annual conference - #Nuclear - Powering the UK, about the importance of public engagement and was interviewed by Energy Live News.

The second annual Women in Nuclear Conference has been the main focus for the committee, getting speakers lined up and the workshop sessions finalised. The conference, which will see around 200 people come together to talk about the importance of gender balance, is becoming a staple in the nuclear calendar.



The Retention committee held another successful speedmentoring event at the NDA supply chain conference on 4 November 2015 supported by John Clarke, NDA CEO, who closed the event.

With a range of experienced mentors from across the nuclear industry involved in the event, the 12 mentees had the opportunity to discuss their careers paths and progression prospects whilst having the chance to network and raise their profile.

Sheri Kayani, a marketing graduate working at NNL in Communications participated as a mentee and said "I saw it as an opportunity to both gain valuable knowledge and experience from industry experts whilst also networking and increasing my confidence. Not only did I get some great connections and contacts who offered to coach me further, but I also gained some real life examples to my questions. I would definitely recommend other WiN UK members to sign up to the next event."

Mariana Asinari, a Principal Structural Analyst at Mott MacDonald has been awarded the first place 'women working in nuclear' award at the FEM'Energia Awards in Paris. WiN UK talks to her to find out about it.

#### What is your job role?

My current role in the company is Principal Structural/Analyst Engineer. I am part of the advanced analysis team of the nuclear division of Mott MacDonald. My role involves the assessment/ design of nuclear power plant structures when subjected to extreme loading such as explosions, seismic events, tornados, and tornados, generated missiles, etc. using finite element techniques.

#### What award did you win and what was it for?

I have been awarded with the first place for the category "women working in nuclear" of FEM'Energia Awards 2015 in Paris. The second place went to Heather Hale from EDF Energy and the third place to Maria Florescu from Raten Citon. The awards were granted by Philippe Sasseigne, the Director of Nuclear Production for EDF and Sophie Lemaire from Westinghouse.

The FEM'Energia Awards have been organised since 2009 by EDF, WiN France and WiN Europe, aiming to recognise the exceptional contribution made by female students and professional women to nuclear activities in France and Europe, promoting women's participation in the nuclear sector and giving more visibility to women in scientific, technical and technological nuclear-related occupations.

#### How did you apply?

The application consisted in 10 questions and was related to the career path of the candidate. The questions were mainly divided into two groups. The first group of questions was orientated to the educational background of the candidate and how they choose their role in the nuclear sector. The second group of question was related to the involvement of the candidate with scientific and/or technical organisations with a particular emphasis on how the candidate will encourage a young woman to decide on a career in the nuclear industry.

#### Who was the judging panel?

This year the human resources manager of EDF nuclear production division (Muriel Hautemulle), the president of WiN France (Dominique Mouillot) and the director of EDF group employer brand formed the jury. They received 135 submissions which were screened on the relevance and quality of the application in regards to its category, the motivation expressed by the candidate with a written presentation of the detailed and true description of the candidate's career and track-record, and the description of her engagements and/or actions in favour of the nuclear sector, if any.

#### Where do you see your career going?

I see myself as a project manager with additional technical skills able to manage medium/large projects. I would also like to be known as an "expert" in particular in the seismic field.



The Richie Lecture took place at the Science Museum in London with the theme 'Energy Leaders of the Future'. It aimed to inspire students to study science and engineering subjects and in turn to develop a new generation of science leaders.

To deliver the best advice for industry we need to have balanced teams of advisers with depth of experience and breadth of approaches.
